While it is well known that first-generation students are less likely to make it through the postsecondary pipeline, research has not examined where in the pipeline we lose these students. This dissertation will examine gaps in the postsecondary pipeline and educational expectations by first-generation status using data from the Educational Longitudinal Study of 2002 and the High School Longitudinal Study of 2009. Using logistic regression and sequential logit methods, this study will examine how gaps by first-generation status change with the addition of control variables and interactions, and whether these gaps change over time. Findings are split into two sections, the first analyzing specific steps in the postsecondary pipeline using logistic regression

methods, and the second analyzing the pipeline as a whole using a sequential logit model. Findings from models examining specific stages within the postsecondary pipeline indicate that with a simple regression first-generation status is negatively correlated with all stages of the postsecondary pipeline and the formation of high educational expectations. After controlling for many factors, the negative association for first-generation status only remained for high expectations and application to college in both samples, and college attendance in the later sample. This indicates that first-generation students are mainly lost prior to college entrance and could imply that first-generation status is not as important once students are in college, or it could mean that first-generation students that make it to college are somehow different from their peers. This study found no evidence that the first-generation gap has changed between the two samples despite rising costs and stagnant financial aid. Findings from a sequential logit model also indicates that level of parental education is tied to a students overall level of education, carrying more weight in earlier transitions. Parental education carries less weight in transitions to earn a bachelors degree or masters degree because fewer students are at risk of the transition and smaller gains are made in overall level of education as a result of passing the later transitions. GARDNER First-generation students are frequently marginalized on their campuses, treated with benign disregard, and placed at a competitive disadvantage because of their invisibility. While they include 51% of all undergraduates, or approximately 9.3 million students, they are less likely than their peers to earn degrees. Among students enrolled in two-year institutions, they are significantly less likely to persist into a second year. First-Generation College Students offers academic leaders and student affairs professionals a guide for understanding the special challenges and common barriers these students face and provides the necessary strategies for helping them transition through and graduate from their chosen institutions. Based in solid research, the authors describe best practices and include suggestions and techniques that can help leaders design and implement effective curricula, out-of-class learning experiences, and student support services, as well as develop strategic plans that address issues sure to arise in the future. The authors offer an analysis of first-generation student expectations for college life and academics and examine the powerful role cultural capital plays in shaping their experiences and socialization. Providing a template for other campuses, the book highlights programmatic initiatives at colleges around the county that effectively serve first-generation students and create a powerful learning environment for their success. First-Generation College Students provides a much-needed portrait of the cognitive, developmental, and social factors that affect the college-going experiences and retention rates of this growing population of college students. As first-generation students gain greater access to higher education, faculty, and staff at colleges and universities must provide intentional engagement that supports their persistence and graduation. This book serves as a guidebook for higher education practitioners seeking to implement or enhance first-generation programming at their institutions. The chapters provide detailed descriptions of the development, implementation, and assessment of programs and practices intended to support the success of first-generation college students. Authors share insights on building allies, identifying and working through challenges, and applicable

takeaways for implementing similar practices and programs at the reader's own institutions. Programming discussed in the book ranges in funding levels and includes activities such as faculty dinners, study abroad, bridge programs, living learning communities, peer mentoring, intrusive advising, and holistic well-being. This valuable resource helps higher education practitioners better support and position first-generation students for success. A revealing look at the experiences of first generation students on elite campuses and the hidden curriculum they must master in order to succeed College has long been viewed as an opportunity for advancement and mobility for talented students regardless of background. Yet for first generation students, elite universities can often seem like bastions of privilege, with unspoken academic norms and social rules. The Hidden Curriculum draws on more than one hundred in-depth interviews with students at Harvard and Georgetown to offer vital lessons about the challenges of being the first in the family to go to college, while also providing invaluable insights into the hurdles that all undergraduates face. As Rachel Gable follows two cohorts of first generation students and their continuing generation peers, she discovers surprising similarities as well as striking differences in their college experiences. This book examines how previously excluded high-achieving, low-income students are faring socially and academically at an Ivy League college in New England. In the past, research conducted on low-income students in elite schools focused mainly on the admissions process. As a result, there is a dearth of research on what happens to lowincome students once they are admitted and attend classes. This book chronicles an ethnographic study of twenty low-income men and women in their senior year at Dartmouth College and follows up with them four and twelve years post-graduation. By helping to bring

visibility and self-awareness to low-income students and expose class issues and struggles, the author hopes to encourage elite institutions to change their policies and practices to address the needs of these students. This collection explores social processes and meanings germane to the educational mobility of first-generation college students before and during their matriculation into higher education. The contributing scholars examine dynamics, policies, practices, and programs that inform college access and persistence for first generation students.

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
